LETTER FROM THEEXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Our city and region have been blessed to be the home to hundreds of artists, and this fall, the Huntington Museum of Art will be presenting exhibits by two of them – former Marshall University professor Stan Sporny and Barboursville, West Virginia, native Sassa Wilkes.

The first exhibit to go on view is *Teach Them to Dream: The Art & Influence of Stan Sporny*, which features the work of the accomplished and extraordinarily regarded artist who passed away suddenly in 2008. The exhibit continues on view through December 30. This exhibit will be followed by *One Hundred Badass Women by Sassa Wilkes Presented by Leslie Petteys in Memory of Her Heroes, Grandmothers Anna C. Petteys & Fannie Christner*. This inspiring show begins November 5 and continues through January 29, 2023, and kicks off with an opening reception on Friday, November 4, 2022, from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

In addition to these two exhibits, the Huntington Museum of Art will present VIETNAM: THE REAL WAR: Photographs from The Associated Press from October 22, 2022, through February 12, 2023. This compelling exhibit will have an opening reception on October 21 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. with a gallery walk and discussion led by Michael "Mickey" Johnson, Vietnam veteran and retired journalist, and Chris White, Marshall University history professor. This exhibit is organized by the Huntsville Museum of Art (Alabama) and The Associated Press (New York City).

Also, later this year, HMA will be hosting its first *Holiday Open House* since 2019 on December 4 from 1 to 4 p.m. in connection with the *Art on a Limb* exhibit of artist-decorated holiday trees. As this year begins to wind down, HMA is already looking forward to an in-person visit in 2023 by our next Walter Gropius Master Artist, the two-time NEA Fellowship awardee Donna Polseno, and the return of the Museum Ball on February 25, 2023.

On a special note, our new book on Huntington artists, "Eclectic Rhythms: The Artists of Huntington, West Virginia, 1871-Present," has earned an honorable mention in the Books & Catalogues category in the 2022 Southeastern Museums Conference (SEMC) Publications Competition. It is exciting and humbling for the book to be honored in such a prestigious competition. As evidenced by "Eclectic Rhythms" and our exhibit schedule this fall, the Huntington Museum of Art remains committed to fostering and supporting local and regional artists while continuing to be an advocate for arts, education and nature.

Thank you to everyone who supports the Huntington Museum of Art and attends our exhibits, presentations, classes, and fundraisers. We appreciate the support of our patrons and members who help us in our mission to serve the people of the Tri-State and beyond.

Teach Them to Dream: The Art & Influence of Stan Sporny

tan Sporny (American, 1946-2008) was an accomplished professional artist and an inspiring teacher, passionately dedicated to helping his students achieve success. He was also an alchemist and a mad scientist, an entrepreneurial dreamer and doer who aimed to revolutionize oil painting with his brand of non-toxic solvents and mediums: "The Sporny Solution." He was always exploring and discovering, teaching and challenging. Classroom discussions ranged from color saturation to Sri Lankan politics, formalism to Foghorn Leghorn. While his students quietly painted, he played the blues on his guitar and shared stories of New Orleans. At the end of the semester, he was known to bring a pot of homemade jambalaya to class.

Stan Sporny was consumed with life, like the fiery colors of the autumn leaves that danced across some of his final canvases. He was courageously outspoken and imparted many valuable lessons, all delivered with characteristic wit and wisdom. His students learned the importance of showing up and getting to work – the rewards would follow naturally. They learned to plan, but also to appreciate that growth requires surrendering to unanticipated possibilities. They learned to prioritize judgment, value subtlety, and celebrate multiple perspectives. He was such an effective artist, teacher, and mentor because he was truly alive with the "art spirit," as described by renowned painter and educator Robert Henri (American, 1865-1929):

When the artist is alive in any person, whatever his kind of work may be, he becomes an inventive, searching, daring, self-expressive creature. He becomes

interesting to other people. He disturbs, upsets, enlightens, and opens ways for better understanding. Where those who are not artists are trying to close the book, he opens it and shows there are still more pages possible.

Born in Philadelphia, Stanley Sporny could remember wanting to be an artist by age eleven. He attended the Philadelphia College of Art from 1964 to 1968 and the University of Pennsylvania from 1969 to 1972, where he studied under noted artists such as Neil Welliver, Red Grooms, Alex Katz, Alice Neel, and Elaine de Kooning. During the summer of 1972, he was sponsored by Katz to attend the prestigious Skowhegan School in Maine. That same year he received an Albright Scholarship to study in Sri Lanka, where he resided for nine years. Sporny taught at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge from 1987 to 1988 before becoming a beloved educator at Marshall University for the rest of his life. He received a Federal Art-in-Architecture Grant in 1993 to create 12 paintings that were installed in the Veterans Hospital in Huntington, WV. Sporny exhibited widely throughout his career, including solo shows in Sri Lanka; Washington, D.C.; Philadelphia, PA; and Atlanta, GA. His latest paintings were featured in Charleston, WV, when he passed away unexpectedly in 2008. His work can be found in public collections such as the National Museum of American Art, Washington, D.C.; the Utah Museum of Fine Art, Salt Lake City, UT; the Ogden Museum of Southern Art, New Orleans, LA; and the Huntington Museum of Art, Huntington, WV.

he Vietnam War (1955-1975) was a costly, grinding, and divisive conflict that ultimately pitted the communist government of North Vietnam and its allies in South Vietnam, known as the Viet Cong, against the South Vietnamese government and its principal ally, the United States. Conflict was heightened by the ratcheting of Cold War tensions between the United States government and its political adversaries in the Soviet Union and China.

The toll in human lives was devastating. More than 3 million people (including more than 58,000 Americans) were killed in the Vietnam War, and more than half of the dead were Vietnamese civilians. Although fighting took place in Vietnam and the neighboring Southeast Asian countries of Laos and Cambodia, the effects of this War continue to compound here at home among a generation of U.S. military veterans, their families, and communities. Per capita, more than any other state, West Virginians answered the call to service. West Virginia's soldiers also suffered the highest casualty rate, per capita. Nine valorous West Virginians were awarded the Medal of Honor, the United States Armed Forces' most prestigious military decoration.

To cover the War, The Associated Press gathered an extraordinary group of superb photojournalists in its Saigon bureau. Collectively, they created one of the greatest photographic legacies of the 20th century and earned an unprecedented six Pulitzer Prizes for coverage of the War. Vietnam: The Real War features 50 large-format images that chronicle the arc of the Vietnam War, curated from the archives of The Associated Press. From Malcolm Browne's photograph of the burning monk and Nick Ut's picture of a 9-year-old running from a napalm attack to Eddie Adams' photograph of the execution of a Viet Cong prisoner, Vietnam: The Real War features images that both recorded and changed history, taken by unbelievably courageous photojournalists.

One Hundred **BADASS** WOMEN by Sassa Wilkes Presented by Leslie Petteys in Memory of Her Heroes,

Grandmothers Anna C. Petteys & Fannie Christner.

he passing of beloved Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg on September 18, 2020, was felt by many as the symbolic climax in a year defined by tumult and tragedy. Justice Ginsburg, champion of gender equity and architect of the legal fight for women's rights, was revered as a cultural and feminist icon. The effects of her death, after serving nearly three consequential decades on the Supreme Court, continue to compound in the lives of everyday Americans.

To honor her life's work and process the immense loss of such a historic figure, artist Sassa Wilkes determined to paint a portrait of Justice Ginsburg. They worked all night, and, by the morning of September 22, Justice Ginsburg's characteristic features emerged from an energetic swirl of color, keen eyes glinting behind her trademark glasses. Justice Ginsburg's distinctive lace collar, represented with gold and silver leaf applied to the canvas, shone out against her black judicial robes. Wilkes realized that there were 100 days left in 2020 and vowed to complete an oil portrait of an inspiring woman each day for the remainder of the year.


"This has been the darkest year I can remember, and I'm turning on the lights."

With this bold declaration, Wilkes embarked on the painting project titled One Hundred Badass Women. As the days passed and the portraits took shape in Wilkes' studio, it quickly became apparent that an entire community of likeminded people was transfixed by the process, eager to channel their emotions into something cathartic, uplifting, and educational. On social media and beyond, the project became a collaboration between artist and audience, sparking important conversations far and wide. Wilkes bravely offered the community a window into their creative process - a vulnerable place for many artists - and provided an opportunity to learn about the accomplishments of extraordinary women, many of whom remain underappreciated or unacknowledged. In response, supporters provided Wilkes an ever-expanding roster of influential women to research and paint. The 100 canvases that resulted from this collaboration, presented in total on the gallery walls, serve as a chronological record of this transformative experience.

Currently the Artist-in-Residence at West Edge Factory in Huntington, West Virginia, Sassa Wilkes is a queer and trans artist working to challenge and expand the cultural understanding of gender in Appalachia. A native of Barboursville, West Virginia, they earned a BFA and an MAT from Marshall University. For the past decade, they have taught art in the Cabell County School District, at Marshall University, and offered art lessons to their community through a private studio.



Walter Gropius Master Artist Program Presents

Donna Polseno

January 14 - April 8, 2023 Joan & Arthur Weisberg Family Gallery

The artist will discuss her work in a free public presentation on March 30, 2023, at 7 p.m. Reception to follow. A three-day workshop will be presented at HMA on March 31 through April 2, 2023, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day.

Integration of Forms and Surface

This workshop will concentrate on hand-built forms and various surface treatments intended to enhance these forms, both in the realm of pottery and sculpture. The hands-on element will include coil building a small sculptural form and slab building a secondary piece intended as a pedestal for the sculpture. We will use drawings and discuss concepts in preparation to create forms that are either contrasting with visual tension, or are complementary with harmony. Additional demonstrations will include glazing techniques used on the artist's pottery and sculpture, as well as carving and texture and the application of stains and underglazes on sculptural forms.

About the Artist

Growing up in Connecticut, Donna Polseno was influenced by her parents. Her mother was skillful and handy and her father, a naturalist, was a painter and illustrator whose work supported the family. Inspired to pursue a career in art, she received a BFA from the Kansas City Art Institute in 1972 and earned an MAT from the Rhode Island School of Design in 1974. Upon graduating, she and her husband moved to rural Floyd, Virginia, in the Blue Ridge Mountains, where they built a studio and a family. Her ceramics have been featured in major museums and galleries across the country. She is represented in numerous private, corporate, and museum collections such as the American Museum of Ceramic Art, Pomona, California; the St. Louis Museum of Art, St. Louis, Missouri; and the Mint Museum of Contemporary Crafts, Charlotte, North Carolina. She has received two National Endowment for the Arts Grants and a Virginia Museum Fellowship. Throughout her successful career, she has balanced the demands of being an award-winning studio artist and a noted educator. She has taught workshops at Anderson Ranch Arts Center, Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts, Banff Center for Arts and Creativity, and Penland School of Craft. She has led college summer programs at Alfred University and the University of Michigan and, from 2004-2020, she taught ceramics part-time at Hollins University in Roanoke, Virginia, where she created and directed the annual Women Working with Clay Symposium. For many years she has taught at La Meridiana Ceramica School, an international ceramics school in Certaldo, Italy, where she and her husband also maintain a small house and studio.

About the Artist's Work

Donna Polseno began her career making pottery and remains an active studio potter, Most pots are slip cast and then altered or reconstructed as she strives to achieve a sense of energy, life, and mystery in her functional work. About her pottery, Polseno states: "I have made many different types of pottery over my career but have always been interested in the way decorative elements can be used to enhance a form, whether one is using an elaborate pattern or the simplest marks." Those surface treatments draw inspiration from the natural world – the shape of leaves, grasses, flowers, birds, and abstractions of these forms.

Beginning in the 1980s, she blazed a creative trail parallel to her pottery: ceramic sculpture. Her figurative ceramic sculptures center around the metaphor that women are the spiritual vessels of life, capable of giving, nurturing, and protecting. While they remain vulnerable and fragile, like the precariousness of all life, these archetypal female forms radiate a sense of strength and universal beauty.

Comic Drawings from the Permanent Collection features original comic book art, comic strips, and sequential drawings created by some of America's most noted comic artists, such as Bob Kane, Ernie Chan and Neil Adams, from the Huntington Museum of Art's Michael Reynolds Collection of American Popular Culture.


"Comic culture is decidedly mainstream," said John Farley, HMA Senior Curator / Exhibition Designer. "It is no longer a niche hobby. The original artwork for newspaper comic strips and comic books is coveted by collectors and exhibited by major museums. Once primarily an American art form, comic books and the pantheon of characters spawned within their pages now connect legions of devoted fans around the world through a common language. Comic sales have risen consistently for decades, and consumer demand continues to reach astonishing heights, a trend supercharged by the popularity of graphic novels and digital downloads."

Throughout its history, comic art has done more than entertain. "Comic art represents a natural evolution of the political cartoons and satirical caricatures which have been printed in European and American newspapers and periodicals since the early 1800s," Farley said. "Cleverly designed interplays of text and image allowed for effective communication with a wide audience, regardless of age or literacy, making this format ideal for delivering social critique, propaganda, and entertainment."

The first comic book featuring original cartoon artwork was released in 1935. However, the Golden Age of Comic Books truly began in 1938 with *Action Comics*, no. 1, when an extraterrestrial infant refugee with superhuman potential crash landed in the idyllic American Midwest. The boy's adopted parents named him Clark Kent, but humanity came to know this archetypal superhero, champion of the oppressed, by his alter-ego: Superman. By the mid-20th century, in addition to a growing number of mainstream comic creators, diverse independent artists, writers, and publishers were producing self-expressive comic art that commented on culture and politics from new perspectives. Barriers continue to be transformed into frontiers for creativity as artists and writers who once had limited voices in the traditional comic industry now enjoy a wider audience and larger platforms to tell their stories.

Daywood Collection

The Daywood Collection exhibit includes such prestigious paintings as Lincoln's Birthday Flags, 1918 and Windmill at Sundown, East Hampton by Childe Hassam; The Heavens are Telling by Emil Carlsen; and The Cedar Walk by William James Glackens. The exhibit also includes an etching titled Descent from the Cross by Rembrandt van Rijn and fan favorites Joyce, an oil painting by Howard Somerville, and The Watcher, an oil painting by Frank Weston Benson.

Arranging and placing the art in a manner that complements both the works and the gallery is just part of the task of creating an exhibition, said HMA Senior Curator/ Exhibition Designer John Farley. "It's a distinct challenge to take a very large collection that encompasses paintings, prints, sculpture and glass and come up with an arrangement that works within the gallery space, but I believe we have created an attractive and informative exhibit," Farley said.


If visitors notice that some of their favorite *Daywood Collection* works are not on display, there is an explanation, Farley said. "Many highlights from *The Daywood Collection*, including the oil painting *Kathleen* by Robert Henri, are currently in a multi-venue, traveling exhibit toured by International Arts & Artists," he said.

The Daywood Collection became the jewel of the Huntington Museum of Art permanent collection when it was donated to HMA, then the Huntington Galleries, in 1967 by Ruth Woods Dayton. She and her husband, Arthur Spencer Dayton, built the collection together until his death in 1948. The Daywood Collection continued to grow through purchases and gifts until 1967.



Join Us in Welcoming Raine Klover




